- Over 200 coho counted in one pool
- Substantial numbers observed in both streams
- Upper Grandon Creek coho population maintained
- Wider fish count planned for 2026, with QBS scientific permit

Water Testing

- Over a decade of water testing on LQR, Grandon and Beach Creeks
- Twice a year for five weeks
- Building regional data base
- RDN and Ministry of Environment partners
- Essential data for protecting our watersheds
- RDN program suspended for the year, but QBS monitoring continued – this year begun on October 14

 New level logger installed in 2024, and volunteers continue to carry out manual water flow measurement to corroborate level logger metrics



Stream Mapping – Year 2

- Beach, Grandon and Whiskey Creek mapping project
- RDN and PSF funding to update detailed stream maps
- Stream bed, inflows and conditions
- Walking the length of the stream in difficult terrain
- Beach Creek and Grandon Creek completed
- Remaining funds to continue Whiskey Creek mapping

Restoration

Little Qualicum River estuary

- Year eleven of project
- Renewal of estuary impacted by industry key salmon habitat
- Over 400 native plant species in irrigated exclosure sites
- RDN, BCCF, Guardians of the Salish Sea Estuaries (GOOSE), DFO
- Five year plan developed and under review by RDN no definite conclusions
- New interpretive signage being developed

2025 LQR work

- Preliminary archeological assessment complete
- Areas of high archeological significance identified in 2024
- Planting sites approved for work under cultural oversight
- October planting of over fifty more large native plants, based on survival experience
- Raymond James Canada Foundation and RDN financial support
